

As reported in last issue's NEWS FLASH. United For Missouri had released their 2017 scorecard on legislative voting. In case you missed it, out of 33 MO Senate members, only 10 scored above a D in their voting records on economic issues, with only 3 getting an A--the other 7 got C's! Of 162 House members, 59 of them (14 Republicans, 45 Democrats) rated an F and 27 more got a D (26 Republicans, 1 Democrat). So 86 (53%) and 10 (30%) of them voted to keep Missouri economically disadvantaged. Why? More MO Did Ya Know?

In the state of Missouri, 2 school board members are elected in local elections held in early April of each year. But did you know that if only 2 people declare a candidacy for school board for those 2 seats their names do not even have to appear on the ballot?! Missouri is one of 8 states where sanctuary cities are banned by law. Wonder if that means city councils "acting like" it is a sanctuary city in Missouri could be turned in to the county sheriff to be arrested? Then again, who enforces the laws if the county sheriff won't?

Word on the street is that the top three priorities for the 2018 legislative session are going to be: economics, education, and adoption/foster care issues. It will be a surprise if much of anything else gets passed. After all, it has already pretty much been decided.

The latest data for Missouri shows a dramatic reduction in abortions: from 19,482 in 1985 to 5,415 in 2013.

The pre-filing period for proposed bills to be introduced in the 2018 legislative session opened on December 1. The rush to file had 30 of the 33 current sitting senators submitting 271 bills and a little over half of the 163 current sitting representatives pre-filing another 302 bills. In fact, from 11 a.m. to close of business on the day prior to this issue's publication, another 32 bills were prefiled, on everything ranging from designating a clubfoot awareness day and an official Missouri tree to another attempt at a Medicaid explosion and establishing failure to identify as an offense! Are school board elections and the way school board members operate once elected, all rigged? If not, there are some pretty suspicious activities that surround it. Don't Erase History at Robert E. Lee Elementary School

In Part 2 we explore the truly important matters at Robert E. Lee Elementary School, and Columbia Public Schools in general.

Lost in all of this effort spent on the standards of historical figures is the far more relevant standard of education of Lee School itself. According to ratings on the website homefacts.com --used by many parents considering moves to other school districts across the country, the past eight years of math ratings at Lee for all students were as follows: C+ (2009), C (2010), C (2011), C- (2012), C- (2013), C (2014), B- (2015), C+ (2016). If nothing else, Lee has reached consistency in imparting math skills to its students. Academic achievement at Lee shows a consistently massive "achievement gap" across demographic groups as well. Where is the outrage surrounding these shameful failures? Countries that take education much more seriously would be conducting severe inquiries of the education bureaucracy, which would likely lead to dismissal, or worse, of the culprits responsible.

Instead of facing the obviously disturbing truth, the Columbia education establishment simply repeat that "we have excellent schools"--as if it were true. Despite being the seat of Missouri's flagship university, many district schools consistently perform far below state standards in math, science and literacy.

Instead, we hear about funding-related matters such as: days missed, graduation rates, free lunches given, and so on. Rarely, if ever, are actual test scores clearly shown on CPS school websites.



Democracy

Democracy may aptly be defined by its Google search: "a system of government by the whole population or all the eligible members of a state, typically via elected representatives." Synonyms: representative government, elective government; self-government, government by the people; republic, commonwealth Usage: "freedom of speech is essential to democracy" Note the synonyms. Similar Google searches yield the following.

Republic-"a state in which supreme power is held by the people and their elected representatives, and has elected or nominated presidents rather than a monarch. Archaic: "a group with a certain equality between its members."

Commonwealth-a group of sovereign states and their dependencies, associated by their own choice and linked with common objectives and interests.

Our founders were well aware of Democracy and found it to be abhorrent. Their reasoning was as follows: 1) it is a tyranny of the majority; 2) none have ever lasted more than 200 years; 3) it always ends violently.

In the Senate, the States had their representatives to protect the individual States' interests until 1913 and the 17th Amendment, at which time we became a functional Democracy.

them a lot—well, maybe not to their faces. The Springfield-based Locke and Smith Foundation review legislation every session and grade it on the impact the passed legislation has "on economic circumstances of the individual and the governments (local, state, and federal), and (on the) increase or decrease in the size, scope, and power of government." Recently, the foundation released their scorecard results, and it doesn't look very good for the Republican legislators Missourians have sent to Jefferson City. The scorecard is extremely tough--once you get past the top five contenders for their annual award, scores drop quickly to the low 40% range in the House and to the high 30% range in the Senate.

Senate--



BREAKING NEWS:

THE GOOD:

The Governor has appointed 3 new Clean Water Commission members, giving them a majority on the board. They are: Mansfield cattle farmer Stan Coday; Stotts City owner of Kleiboeker's Clover Creek Farms, John Kleiboeker; and Pat Thomas, who is chief of staff for Republican Senator Brian Munzlinger, who sponsored the bill that former Democrat Governor Nixon vetoed because opponents said members of the public don't have the expert knowledge to make sound decisions on the issues. The Clean Water Commission, grants permits to large factory farms.

THE BAD:

The Governor's office has been found to be skirting the Missouri Sunshine Law, which says that government records are to be available to the public upon request (well, IF you can afford the conveniently exorbitant copying charges, that is). Instead, the Governor's staff has been found to have cell phone apps that allow text messages to delete immediately. You may recall some of the fights over the archiving of government emails in the past, since those are considered to be government records as well.

THE UGLY:

"DING DONG, THE WITCH IS GONE!" is the sentiment of many on the Missouri education scene still fighting to rid Missouri of Common Core (now known as "Missouri Learning Standards"), since the Governor has indirectly managed to fire Commissioner of Education Margie Vandeven, head of the corrupt regime known as the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (aka DESE). The department, under Vandeven's rule, made the decision not to report the 2016-2017 End of Course (EOC) assessment results in Algebra I and English II. That, other apparent "cooking of the books" on school scores, lying to Missourians concerned about the education of Missouri children, and perhaps even breaking Missouri law, is likely what sealed her fate. DESE employs nearly 2,000 state employees to monitor, direct, and coerce 517 school districts in the state of Missouri, many times over objections of parents and over the heads of local school boards.
