

"An honest process produces good law" is their motto, and this nameless (as far as we know) group of Missourians claim to have the solution to fix Missouri's representation problem.

The state representatives we vote in to office have no power to bring a bill to a vote on the house floor, and without a chance to be voted on, the most popular idea can never become law.

A couple thousand bills are introduced every session by the representatives we elect, but only those supported by a few in House leadership positions will ever see the light of day. The speaker of the house, the floor leader, and the chairman of the committee the bill is assigned to by the Speaker will have complete control of a bill advancing through the process or dying.

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

The fix is about to already be in. The Republican legislative members will caucus on Monday, November 13 to decide, among not many other things, which bills will be allowed to see the light of day during the 2018 legislative session. Here is how this power play works:

1. If and when a bill might be assigned to a committee, and what committee it is assigned to, is the sole decision of the speaker of the house. If the speaker has (continued on Page 3)

The Missouri Republican Assembly is the state level of the National Federation of Republican Assemblies, an organization with roots going back to the 1930's and with strong ties to former President Ronald Reagan. Real, Conservative, Honest Republicans An Oxymoron? By Jun Snow

With all the cat fights, bickering, leaking, back-stabbing and name-calling going on in the Republican Party, it is time to take a deep breath and see if some clarity can calm the current chaos besetting us: let those of us who have labored since the Reagan Revolution point Republicans back to their roots.

President Reagan was greatly influenced by Michigan State University English professor Russell Kirk. Kirk is widely recognized as one of the premier thinkers of this era and an articulate, respected voice of what has become known as American conservatism. When it seems Republicans claim they are – or wish they were – or falsely claim to be – a conservative – it would be "prudent" to review Kirk's stance on the matter.

What exactly is a conservative? To answer that, turn to page 8 of Kirk's conservative classic, "The Conservative Mind: From Burke to Eliot." It is there Kirk offers what he calls "the six canons" of conservatism. If you adhere to "all" of them, then you are a conservative:

1. Belief in a transcendent order (God), or a body of natural law, which rules society as well as conscience." Political problems," Kirk writes, "at bottom, are religious and moral problems." One conflict between conservatives and liberals is their view of humans. To conservatives, humans are sinners and not to be trusted. To liberals, humans are good, maybe even perfectible.



Don't Erase History at Robert E. Lee Elementary School By Joan Rawson

In the current highly polarized political atmosphere, the frenzy to destroy historical symbols of "an oppressive country" is not surprising. Disturbing is not the severe ignorance of Robert E. Lee's character and achievements, but the idea no facts are at issue. The historical person is not the motivator in the school naming controversy. The real agenda of the hardcore activists driving the protests is to undermine our country's core values: individualism, heroic efforts, and any concept of greatness itself.

According to vast evidence, the most recent target of the 'history puritans' is grossly unfair. Lee said slavery was an evil institution, freed his wife's slaves, and testified after the war in Congress in an effort to prevent violence by vigilante groups in the South. By all accounts, Lee was brilliant, honorable, measured, stoic, and concerned at all times with minimizing unnecessary loss of innocent life both during and after the war. As the president of what was to become Washington and Lee University, he devoted his final years to healing and reconciliation among Americans. All through his life, Lee was admired by his ideological opponents. But today, any possibility of respecting the character of one's adversary, or someone who holds a different viewpoint, seems laughable. No matter the facts, "the other" must be castigated, demonized, and ultimately eliminated from memory.

3. Conviction that civilized society requires orders and classes, as against the notion of a "classless society." With reason, conservatives often have been called "the party of order," Kirk says. (continued from Page 2) and emotional bureaucrats) fill the vacuum. Ultimate equality in the judgment of God and equality before courts of law are embraced by conservatives. Equality in outcome (picking winners and losers for example), imposed by oligarchs and emotional bureaucrats, flies in the face of order and freedom.

4. Freedom and property ownership are inseparable. Separate them, and the government becomes master of all. Economic leveling is not economic progress, Kirk reminds us.

5. Faith in prescription and distrust of "sophisters and calculators who would reconstruct society upon abstract designs." Man must put a control upon his will and his appetite, knowing that he is governed more by emotion than reason. Emotion, when unbridled, will ultimately lead to chaos and tyranny.

6. Conservatives recognize that change is not always productive and "hasty innovation" may be a "devouring conflagration, rather than a torch of progress." Indeed, society must alter, "for prudent change is the means of social preservation...and a statesman must take Providence" into account, Kirk teaches us. Kirk was a Christian, who believed that if you separate Christianity and Western Civilization, the result will be disastrous.

A statesman's chief virtue is prudence, per Plato and Edmund Burke, and why conservatives at the base level, abhor such radical actions as the Affordable Care Act, government picking economic winners and losers by Wall Street bailouts, or tax breaks for a new stadium for the local sports team. In such instances, prudence seems to be the first casualty.

In the American system of government the struggle has been to keep a central government under control so that maximum individual freedom and liberty is maintained. Our English ancestors understood that as power concentrates, freedom wanes. What has been lost is that other forms of government tend to concentrate power in the hands of the few so they may rule over the masses.

The forms of government that routinely grab power into the hands of a very few are as follows: theocracy (rule by a religious leader), monarchy (rule by royalty that may not be good rulers), fascism (rule by one party, headed by a dictator), dictatorships, and Communism (total government control of everything). No government at all is known as anarchy, and the only limited governments are democratic republics--i.e.: the United States--at least, as it was founded in 1776; or a Constitutional monarchy such as the U.K., New Zealand, Australia and a few others that still recognize a monarch. Democracy is mob rule, where if you are part of the mob, you have it made—but if you are not, you are not likely to survive the violence.

All of those forms grabbing power and concentrating in only a privileged few while claiming to be "for the people" or the "good of all" are only truly intent on complete and total government control of the population under them. Fascists and Communists are both Socialists-two sides of the same coin-and are to the right of *nothing* in a free society.

no interest in it, it may be assigned very late in the session to a committee where it will never get a hearing, much less a vote. This happens routinely. And since the chairman of that committee is appointed by the speaker in the first place, that chairman can also be removed by him at any time.

2. If a bill is assigned to a committee in a timely manner, the chairman will control when and if it will be heard. Many bills die in committee--never having been heard and never voted on.

3. If a bill is heard and voted out by the committee with a "Do Pass" status, it often is never scheduled for a vote on the house floor. This is, again, at the complete discretion of the floor leader and the speaker.

When you go to the Capitol, it is no wonder why lobbyists are lined up to meet with a just a couple of power brokers, while your representative's office may be devoid of any lobbyist activity. Once you have testified and worked for bills very popular with citizens and certain representatives a few times, only to see them languish and die, you figure out that the process is obviously broken. In fact, We the People, even through these elected representatives, quickly find we citizens have little real voice in our state government.

A group of citizens have concocted a plan to reform this broken process, one that would allow those we elect to actually make the laws—the reason they are sent to Jefferson City in the first place. The group looks to empower all elected representatives to bring forward bills, have them considered in an honest and open forum, and, as a body, be able to vote on them. If need be, the group hopes to craft a way this process can happen despite the house leadership. From the introduction of a bill to a vote on the house floor, the opinion and priorities of all those elected should drive the process, not just the opinions (continued on Page 4)

Mahatma Gandhi would not survive such unprecedented scrutiny. Gandhi insisted on using an offensive pejorative for blacks and made numerous overtly racist statements.

One of Columbia's highest-ranking academic elementary schools, Ulysses S. Grant Elementary, is itself named after a severely flawed individual. An upcoming biography on General Grant by Ron Chernow shows the leader of the Union Army—and later President—was deeply imperfect, but heroically accomplished, and overcame profound personal weaknesses on his path to greatness. Grant was an alcoholic who presided over one of the most corrupt administrations in history.
